

TISAS Paragraph Template Instructions: Under the descriptions of each element of a body paragraph, write your version.
Thesis statement: should include the author's first and last name, the type of work, the title of the work, the literary device(s) you are using, and the theme that you are proving.
Topic Sentence: Introduces focused argument for the paragraph aka "mini thesis". This should address a component of your thesis. Example: When Mr. Bittering arrives on Mars, he is not prepared to see himself as anything but an Earthling on Mars, an idea that Bradbury introduces through the characters' changing eye color.
<u>Introduce Supporting Evidence</u> : Set up your writing to link topic sentence to first example of evidence (quote or specific example from the text). Establish context that leads to the quote/example



<u>Introduction to Supporting Evidence:</u> Introduce quote number two with context	
Supporting Evidence : Quote number two; don't forget to use TLC	
Analysis of Supporting Evidence: Unpack the significance of your quote.	

Summary Sentence: This sentence ties the two different levels of analysis in your paragraph together and comments on their significance. Another way to think about this, is "Why does what I just wrote matter?" or, "So what?"
